

## Message from the Chairman

Volunteerism is an integral part and very much the lifeblood of any charitable organization. That certainly holds true for **Children's Ability Fund**.

The 2009/2010 fiscal year met a new high in volunteer hours for The Children's Ability Fund. During the year we logged a total of 767 hours of volunteer time. The **Children's Ability Fund** goal is to create awareness and enhance independence by providing specialized equipment for people with disabilities.


Our focus is on children but age or type of disability is not a consideration when reviewing an application. Applications are accepted from individuals residing in Edmonton and Northern Alberta and are prioritized depending on basic needs, immediacy of the request and financial need.

Funding is directed towards three basic areas:

- Individuals
- Groups
- Community

## Equipment



Parents like us have enough to worry about without having to worry about finding the finances to buy necessary equipment for their child with a disability. It's such a great thing when you have organizations like the Children's Ability Fund working for us. We are grateful for their support.

Specialized equipment includes such items as:

**Mobility Devices** – Wheelchairs, walkers, overhead lifts, porch lifts, vehicle lifts, ramps, lift chairs, hospital beds, tilt systems, standing frames, car seats, leg braces

**Communication Devices** – TTY's, signaling devices, Voice synthesizers, FM systems

**Other Technology** – Alphasmarts, Braille printers, zoom text, joysticks, keyboards

### Bikes for Tykes Program

The **Bikes** for **Tykes** program was introduced to provide funding for the adaptation of a bicycle for the individual needs of a child with a disability. Our goal is to provide a means for a child to participate in the everyday activities that all children enjoy; riding to the park, exploring unknown territory and spending time with friends. Bikes provide an independent mode of transportation that helps build self-esteem and gives a sense of freedom. Special adaptations to a bicycle an help a child with disabilities "delight in being a child".

The scope of this project ranges from minor adaptations to a fully customized bicycle to provide the necessary support for a child's personal needs. Cost of adaptations can range from \$500 up to \$1,800 for a customized bicycle.

## Keyboards for Kids Program

The **Keyboards for Kids** program was introduced to provide funding for a portable, battery-powered, word-processing keyboard (Alphasmart Neo) for children with unique learning needs. This device allows students to produce more work with less energy expenditure, giving a greater sense of accomplishment and more enthusiasm for writing and learning.

Although the original focus of our **Keyboards for Kids** program was on individuals, we realized that AlphaSmart

Neos, a simple piece of equipment could be beneficial to schools and be a valuable tool to several special needs students year after year. In addition, working through the schools will raise awareness of the tools that are available to children with disabilities both at home and at school.

This year the **Children's Ability Fund** partnered with the Telus Edmonton Community Board to purchase Alphasmarts to be distributed to school districts in the Edmonton Capital Region.

## Children's Ability Fund Bursary

The Bursary was established as the Dr. GRA Rice Bursary in 1987 to recognize the 40th anniversary of the NACCF and the commitment of Dr. Rice and his support of the disabled citizens of northern Alberta. In 2002 the name of the bursary was changed to the Children's Ability Fund Bursary. The bursary is awarded annually in amounts up to \$5,000 at the discretion of the Board of Directors and may be allocated to more than one individual. The selection committee bases its decision on personal accomplishments and financial need.



The Children's Ability Fund Bursary of \$3,000 was awarded to Jared Carbert of Edmonton. Jared was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at the age of 15. "I am working hard on my studies and enjoying being in the forestry program. I am very grateful to have been awarded this grant."

# Special programs

### Lone Star Program

The Lone Star Program Program is a program that offers a grant annually in amounts up to \$2,500 to assist organizations that provide therapeutic riding and are recognized by the Canadian Therapeutic Riding Association (CanTRA). Therapeutic riding is a form of therapy using horses to benefit persons with various disabilities ranging from physical to emotional.

## Camping Under the Star

The Camping Under the Star program offers a grant of \$5,000 to not-for-profit recreational facilities and organizations providing recreational opportunities to children with disabilities in northern Alberta.

The Children's Ability Fund also considers requests from groups and organizations working for the betterment of people with disabilities within their community.

In 2009, the following groups received grants for equipment totaling \$9,944


- Dogs with Wings accessible doorway

## Barrier Free Playground Grants

The Barrier Free Playground program offers a grant in the amount of \$5,000 to groups constructing a new playground that meets the new Annex H standards. Annex H spells out the base level requirement for what constitutes an accessible playspace and will ensure that all playspaces are both safe and accessible so everyone in the community can participate.

Our goal is three-fold:

- · to "enhance the independence of children with disabilities"
- to encourage the inclusion of accessible playground equipment for children of all abilities
- to create awareness about the issue of accessibility for all children at the playground and within the community

## Sledges in School

In 1997, the **Children's Ability Fund** teamed up with the Paralympic Sports Association to provide funding for 12 new sledges to kick off a brand new program **Sledges in Schools**. Through the **Sledges in Schools** Program (operated by the PSA) sledges are loaned to schools throughout Edmonton and northern Alberta for use in physical education skating programs. The goal is to open doors and enhance the independence of school aged children and youths who are unable to participate in regular ice skating programs.

The **Sledges in Schools** Program continues to be a great opportunity for children with a disability to stay active and participate with their classmates in skating programs and activities at school. It has also created awareness for the sport of sledge hockey in Alberta.

## Community

The **Children's Ability Fund** has been working in communities in Northern Alberta since 1947. Part of our commitment to the community goal is active participation through sponsorship of events that promote awareness and provide opportunities for children with special needs to participate in fun activities.



Vippee Ki-Yay

This year was the 14th annual Rodeo Magic, a pre-event to the Canadian Finals Rodeo. Competing cowboys, rodeo queens and other members of the rodeo community gave of their time to make Rodeo Magic an enthusiastic morning of "rodeo" activities at Northlands for children with disabilities. There were numerous activities for over 150 young Cowgirls and Cowboys— a stagecoach ride, calf roping, barrel riding, face painting, butter making and pin-the-tail-on-the-donkey.



Monday Morning Magic

Monday Morning Magic (hosted by Northlands) is a special event that gives hundreds of children with disabilities the opportunity to enjoy Capital Ex away from the hustle and bustle of the crowds. This year over 500 children along with their families and caregivers were able to enjoy the rides and a special program of entertainment and fun with help from the Edmonton Eskimos.



Rodeo of Smiles

Rodeo of Smiles is a special day for children with disabilities held every year at the Leduc Black Gold Rodeo. billy ability is on hand to meet with the participants as they enjoy a variety of rodeo activities.

### Wheelbasics Wheelchair Skills Camp

Wheelbasics Wheelchair Skills Camp is a camp hosted by the Glenrose Rehabilitation Hospital for children with physical disabilities. This camp was designed to teach maneuvers and techniques to children ranging in age from 2 to 10. Stations focus on improving skills, including dealing with

mock obstacles, transferring in and out of a wheelchair, managing outdoor barriers and everyday activities such as grocery shopping or going to see a movie. Exercises are geared towards specific functions such as opening doors, dealing with uneven ground and doing wheelies to get over curbs.

## Fundraising



Campaign 2010 Walking'n rolling in our community

More than 90% of the requests we get for individual equipment are for some kind of mobility device. The majority are for BASIC needs to assist people to be more independent in their homes, at school or in the workplace and to be more active in their community. A walker can cost as much as \$3,000, a specialized stroller \$6,000, a power wheelchair with a tilt system, upwards of \$10,000 and modifications to make a vehicle accessible for a wheelchair - \$20,000 or more!

Just image the difference this piece of equipment has made for Faith and her Mom.

**Faith says** . . . "Thank you for my new tilt system – I love it! It makes it so much easier to breathe when I can tilt my chair."

Faith's Mom says . . . "Thank-you for your support – we really appreciate it. I believe that children with a disability should be a priority. This (and other kinds of equipment) helps build their self esteem, self confidence, makes them more independent and gives them an opportunity to be more like everyone else."

Thanks to the generosity of individuals, organizations, groups, clubs and corporations we were able to reach our goal of \$100,000 to help purchase new equipment just like Faith's tilt system.

The **Children's Ability Fund** relies on the generosity of our loyal donors to provide the necessary dollars so we may continue to provide funding for specialized equipment to those most in need.

#### Endowment Fund

Each year the Endowment Fund provides funding to assist with the administration and overhead cost of the Children's Ability Fund ensuring that all donations received are used to purchase equipment.


#### **Endowment Fund**
